Student Guide to APA style

Print Sources

- Title your list “References”. Arrange all works, both print and non-print, in one alphabetical list by author (or title if no author.) All entries are double spaces with no extra spaces between each entry.
- Type the first line of each entry at the left margin and indent each following line one tab space.
- Within the body of your work, cite the author’s last name and the year of publication. For example: (Smith, 2002).
- These are just a few examples of how you would cite materials in an APA styled paper. Please consult the *Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association* located at the Reference desk for more detailed information.

Book with one author

Wilson, F. R. (1998). *The hand: How its use shapes the brain, language, and human culture*. New York: Pantheon.

Book with two authors

Eggins, S. & Slade, D. (1997). *Analysing casual conversation*. London: Cassell.

Book with an editor

Feldman, P. R. (Ed.). (1997). *British women poets of the romantic era*. Baltimore: Johns Hopkins UP.

Book with no author or editor

Merriam-Webster’s collegiate dictionary (10th ed.). (1993) Springfield, MA: Merriam-Webster.

Encyclopedia article with no author or editor

Bulimia. (2001). In *The encyclopedia Americana* (Vol. 4 pp. 756). Danbury, CT: Grolier.

Journal article

Craner, P. M. (1991). New tool for an ancient art: The computer and music. *Computers and the humanities*, 25, 303-313.

Journal article with a corporate author

American Psychological Association. (1992). Ethical principles of psychologists and code of conduct. *American Psychologist*, 47, 1957-1611.

Magazine article

Mehta, P. B. (1998, June 6). Exploding myths. *New Republic*. 17-19.

Newspaper article

Lohr, S. (1998, April 3). Now playing: Babes in cyberspace. *New York Times*, pp. C1+.
